WHEREAS: By their dedication to the timeless common values of hard work,

enterprise, faith, family and freedom Korean Americans in Georgia help strengthen our communities, build our State's prosperity; and enrich our

society in many ways; now

THEREFORE I, SONNY PERDUE, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim

2003 to be the CENTENNIAL YEAR OF KOREAN IMMIGRATION in Georgia and call upon all Georgians to observe the anniversary with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities honoring Korean immigrants and their descendants for their countless contributions to Georgia and our

nation.
